At the end of both Key Stage 1 and 2, children are expected to meet the Age Related Standards for maths, reading, writing as well as Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar (SPAG). This is known as the expected standard. We were delighted with our results, which were significantly above national averages and in the top 10% of schools nationally.

# Pupil Premium

The Pupil Premium is an allocation of additional funding provided to schools to support specific groups of children who are vulnerable to possible underachievement. These include pupils who are entitled to free school meals; those looked after by the local authority and children of armed service personnel. The intended effect of this funding is to accelerate progress and raise attainment.

In most cases the Pupil Premium is allocated to schools and is clearly identifiable. It is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium, allocated to schools per FSM pupil, is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility.

In the 2015/16 academic year High Littleton Church of England Primary School received £21,876 in Pupil Premium funding. Below is how we spent the money allocated, to raise attainment during the academic year.
